

City of Frankfort Financial Health



- Financial Recap
 - The following represents the financial goals for the City of Frankfort and the status of each goal as of year-end 2023.
- Capital
 - Goal = Fund 100% of Capital Requested
 - Status = The City's Capital Improvement Plan is funding over \$15.3M in capital over a six-year period (2023-2028). All capital requests are funded as of year-end 2023.
- Cash Reserves
 - Goal = 180 Days
 - Status = The City ended the year with 163 days of cash on hand. The Plan is moving in the right direction by growing cash reserves from 128 days in 2019 to 163 days in 2023. The City's major operating funds have 154 days of cash reserves. Overall, the funds tracked within the financial plan grew approximately \$670K in 2023.



Budget

- Goal = Budget = Projected Revenues
- Status = The City's goal for Budget moving forward is to be able to budget based on ensuing year projected revenues. To achieve this goal, the City must continue to allow Revenue growth to outpace Budget growth. Once this goal is achieved, all unused appropriations will result in cash growth for the City.
- The City managed its budget throughout the year and was able to contribute an additional \$480,000 out of the General Fund towards a fire apparatus. This was possible from the result of unused appropriation, described next.

- General Fund Unused Appropriation
 - Goal = 0% Unused Appropriation
 - Status = General Fund Unused Appropriations for year-end 2024 were 5.4%. As a result, the City's General Fund was able to contribute towards a fire apparatus.
- For reference:
 - Unused Appropriations
 - **2020 = 2.0%**
 - **2021 = 4.4%**
 - **2022 = 5.0%**
 - **2023 = 5.4%**





Community Development & Outreach















Community Development Office oversees the communications and marketing strategy for the City of Frankfort. Some of the daily tasks is the configuration of the City's website, connecting with residents through the Connect Frankfort IN App, Facebook, Instagram, and YouTube.

The goal for 2023 with the City of Frankfort was having material that had bilingual information readily available. This was accomplished through event flyers, forms, and the City's website. Entry information at Old Stoney was translated to allow for easy access to the correct department. This goal will continue through 2024, but was a great start to being accessible to all.

The Community Development Office oversees all of the outreach and engagement opportunities to decrease the gap of communications between City Hall and Elected Officials to the residents and businesses of Frankfort. Two programs that launched in 2022 and still engage residents today is the City Night Outs/ Ice Cream Socials, Coffee & Conversation, Coffee Talks with Mayor Sheets, and Muffins with the Mayor at CORE Community Center.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT:

- Collaborated with Frankfort Main Street on downtown projects
- In the Spring the Sapphire Bay Aquatic Park and new Police Department Headquarters opened with Grand Opening celebrations
- Fundraised over \$7,000 for Community Events
- Coordinated the RAICES Festival (Hispanic Heritage Festival) with local organizations including the Frankfort Parks Department
- Collaborated with United Way and the City of Frankfort Human Resources to raise over \$33,000.00 for the 2023 Campaign
- Attended numerous Ribbon Cuttings with the Clinton County Chamber of Commerce and Frankfort Main Street

GRANTS:

- The City of Frankfort was awarded over \$300,000.00 from FEMA to help with disaster relief from the tornado and spring weather
- The City of Frankfort was awarded \$20,000 from the Clinton County Community Foundation for a Downtown Parking and Housing Feasibility Study

Redevelopment Commission funded over \$45,000 toward façade grants in the Downtown Historic District. The RDC funded \$100,000 towards Prairie Creek Park from the Economic Development Plan. They also helped fund \$125,000 for an alley activation on Washington Street in between Arni's and Ellis Jewelers.

- Downtown Projects including murals, parking solutions, EV charging stations
- Small Business Packets Welcome Home
- Working with Building Services and Clinton County on the ADA/Title IV Transition plans with a volunteer coalition
- Develop marketing material with city amenities

Frankfort Fire Department



- City approval to move forward with the new Station 4 project.
 Design and budget approved for the new station
- New Quint (apparatus) for station 4 has been approved and the order placed
- New Pumper (apparatus) to replace Engine 3 was approved and paid for by the city and the pumper has been ordered
- Major concrete work done at all 3 stations.
 - Headquarters- New approach to maintenance shop
 - Station 2 Renovated the front approach including all new curbs and new green space.
 - Station 3 Renovated the parking area for employees.
- Kitchen remodel completed at fire headquarters and added a commercial stove
- Purchased new Thermal Imaging Cameras to attach to our RIT bags. This addition helps firefighters more efficiently assist in the rescue of victims and firefighters
- Upgraded our attack nozzles and replace worn and outdated fire hose
- Purchased a new hazardous materials trailer. This is the first upgraded piece of equipment for hazardous materials since 2000
- Purchased additional SCBA's, 5 in total
- Formed a Firefighter Honor Guard sector.

In 2023 we have upgraded, enhanced and instituted many new policies, equipment and training programs to our department. This list is a highlight of the major projects, equipment and trainings that we did in 2023. An estimated 2.7 million dollars has been invested into the progression and growth of our department in the 2023 fiscal year. We are thankful and appreciate the city's position to continue to support our department and our growth.

About Frankfort Code Enforcement

The Code Enforcement Division is staffed with two officers who divide the city in half. One officer patrols the north side of Clinton Street and the other, the south side. In 2023, Code Enforcement Officers created 787 incidents that resulted in 350 citations and 462 warnings. Downtown parking accounted for 70 of the annual citations. Code enforcement is responsible for property maintenance in regards to trash and debris, parking violations, junk vehicles, grass complaints etc. Some of their time is spent in city court as well as working with the Clerk-Treasurer's office and City Attorney to file lien paperwork. The officers work Monday through Friday and are under the direction of Captain Brady Sorrells.

- 414 Total Collisions (11% decrease)
- 352 Collisions resulting in property damage (14% decrease)
- 60 Collisions resulting in injury (1% increase)
- 2 Collisions resulting in fatality (200% increase)

GRANTS

- In 2023, FPD received a grand total of \$303,885!
- \$250,000 COPS Hiring Grant
 - This grant was awarded to the department to hire two additional police officers for 2024.
- \$16,385 CHIRP
 - CHIRP (Comprehensive Highway Injury Reduction Program) utilizes federal dollars provided by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute to fund overtime projects. Officers who work the grant conduct highly visible traffic enforcement during various times of the year.
- \$16,000 Opioid Settlement Funds for mental health training.
- \$8,000 Center Township Trustee for virtual reality software
- \$4,000 Drug and Alcohol Coalition for flock safety cameras
- \$4,000 Clinton County Prosecutor for flock safety cameras
- \$3,000 CF Industries for equipment
- \$2,500 Indiana State Police Crimes Against Children Taskforce

 - This was used for our department as well as assisting other departments across the city and the utilities.














